



FACULTY RESOURCE NETWORK TRANSITION MEMO

**From Dr. Charlton D. McIlwain, NYU Vice Provost for Faculty Development,
Pathways, and Public Interest Technology**

The past few years have brought new challenges and opportunities for the Faculty Resource Network (FRN), its member institutions, and participating faculty. Over these years, we have shifted some of the network's programs to meet these challenges. This year, we are seizing an opportunity to begin transitioning the structure of the FRN to enable greater levels of institutional research collaboration and faculty development support, increase the potential for student and faculty exchanges, and more.

Here are some of the near-term implications of the FRN's initiated transition:

- We will not collect dues for Academic Year 2025 (September 2024 through August 2025).
- The FRN Scholar-in-Residence (SIR) Program will conclude at the end of the fall 2024 term. Faculty that have been accepted to participate this fall will not be impacted.
- We will continue to host the FRN Network Summer Program in 2025 and beyond, though there will be some changes in both structure and programming.
- Our remote fellowships and teaching consultations, Immersive Technology Lab Consultations, and University Associates Program will continue with modifications and participation limits.

- The FRN Leadership Initiative and Digital Leadership Community of Practice will continue.
- All current institutional members will continue to be institutional members with access to participate in all the network offers in the coming years.
- An invitation to meet with all of the FRN Liaison Officers to discuss the program changes and future engagement among schools was extended.

The decision to initiate the FRN's structural transition is part and parcel of our commitment to building up and significantly increasing the range of cross-institutional collaborations that we can help inspire among our member institutions. It is based on a combination of factors many of you are aware of and have discussed over the past few years, including institutional financial hardships; institutions building their own faculty development resources, a waning lack of capacity for significant participation and others.

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

Our 2024–2025 program cycle will welcome a cohort of up to 21 participants.


Delivered remotely via Zoom, the program will be held over two semesters (fall 2024 and spring 2025), with six sessions each term.
